I was fortunate to go to a mainstream secondary school because although there were many challenges, I felt much freer. Having the opportunities to join school councils and be a Youth MP enabled me to prove myself and it was at that point that my teachers saw my capabilities and started encouraging me to go to university.

Kashmire is by far one of the most phenomenal people I have had the honour of working with. He is passionate and empathetic and will always do his best for those around him. He has the ability to network, connect with people from all walks of life, and effectively articulate his thoughts. Going to university enabled me to be free and stretch my legs. It taught me independence and gave me opportunities I never thought I would have.

One of the opportunities I had during my time at univeristy was a trip to Brussels for my European Union module.

Seeing the number of trade unions and visiting the business organisations opened my eyes to how complex the European Union is! This was particularly relevant for me as the EU Referendum was one of the first votes I was able to take part in as it was the year I turned 18.

My visit to Brussels took place a year and a half after the referendum which meant the negotiations had started and there was a buzz of excitement in the air.

We even saw President Macron's motorcade drive past us as he headed to the chamber!

My studies at university helped prepare me for my future in politics. I learnt about how each government and Prime Minister throughout history has shaped Britain, and this helped me become more informed in my own political knowledge.

I chose to focus my dissertation on what influenced the young voters. Through this I gained more awareness of the influence of policy platforms, and this helped me as I became more involved in campaigning.

My hard work at university paid off and last year I graduated with a BA in Politics!


Chapter 2

My involvement in politics

I knew before arriving at university that I wanted to get stuck in. I did not imagine that I would be elected as the Student Union Disabled Students Representative within a month of arriving!

My role was to be a champion for disabled students by putting their views forward on panels and campaigning for them across campus.

I held this position for two years and many exciting opportunities arose from this including a visit to Parliament for the launch of Disability History Month.



One of the conferences I attended every year as part of this role was the National Union of Students (NUS) Disabled Students Conference in Manchester. This was with other universities and we were involved in national campaigns.

I got elected onto the NUS Disabled Students Committee and in April 2019 I was even chosen to speak at the organisation's national conference in front of 600 people!

The conference was discussing the 3.6 million pound deficit and the way to bridge this. If an agreement had not been reached and passed there would have been catastrophic consequences including the NUS going into administration and bankruptcy.





A personal highlight for me during this time was to represent the National Citizen Service at the march for the 100th anniversary of the Armistice. We gathered on the Mall to hold the two minute silence and then marched past Trafalgar Square and ended at St James Park where there were 10,000 people. We laid wreaths at the Cenotaph.

My biggest highlight, and my most exciting political experience so far, was meeting the current Shadow Secretary of State for Justice, David Lammy. What particularly inspires me about David, is that he always has and always will fight for equality and justice. I felt empowered by the reasons for him being in politics, the representation he has being a member of parliament and the MP for Tottenham, and the way in which he engages with people, particularly those from Black and Ethnic Minority communities and the young.

In 2015 I became a member of the Labour Party. Later that year I started getting involved in campaigning, and a few weeks before the 2015 election I took part in door knocking for the first time.

We spoke to people about supporting the Labour Party and the importance of voting. It was interesting to hear people's different perspectives on politics. People were happy to engage in conversation about it and I learnt a lot!

I had the buzz now more than ever, so I continued to take part in campaigns and joined 6,000 people in a rally in Birmingham two days before the 2017 election.

I had the opportunity to meet our current Labour Leader, Sir Keir Starmer, twice. He was invited to address the Wolverhampton Christmas Do in 2016, and then I joined him in door knocking for the West Midlands Mayoral election in 2017.



Chapter 3

Working towards my future

After graduating from university I began to think carefully about what I want to do as a career. My work coach has been showing me different options in the civil service and charity sectors. She has been impressed with my CV which has given me confidence to push myself.

But of course, that's not all I have been doing.





Since August I have been on the West Midlands Young Combined Authority Board. As part of this role I attend events, and I even got to speak at the Combined Authority Board in front of the Mayor of the West Midlands, Andy Street, and all the other council leaders.

I updated the Combined Authority Board on the work the Youth Board had been doing such as the West Midlands 2041 paper on the environment which discusses the West Midlands being carbon neutral by 2041.



Alongside this I am also a member of the West Midlands Trains Stakeholder Equality Group where I am involved in improving accessibility on the railways. We will be viewing the new train design soon to give our feedback on its accessibility.

We are also running an accessibility conference to start a discussion around how we can collectively ensure greater accessibility to the railway.

Another of my passions is football so of course I am also a member of the Wolverhampton Wanderers Fans Parliament where I was the first person to go from being a member of the very first youth parliament to being a member of the adult parliament. This parliament ensures there are people scrutinising Wolves' leadership.

One of my favourite past times is watching the team play. So far I have seen them play 99 times! I have even been guest of the club once and I was invited onto the pitch during half time.



Kashmire made history as one of the first 2 Young Combined Authority reps to speak at the official West Midlands Combined Authority Board. He has been a passionate advocate for his city, inclusion, and the importance of youth voice. It is clear that Kashmire's brand of leadership is very much centred on enthusiasm and commitment. Always ready to put himself forward, Kashmire takes a positive approach to both opportunity and challenge – a mindset needed for thriving in a political environment!
